HEAD TO SOUTHERN JAPAN TO FIND

Taking the Zen path of a pilgrim

DESPITE being told I was too late in the season for whale-watching, two of them suddenly appeared and headed in my direction. They were scary specimens, carried on the conveyor belt of a sushi restaurant.

It wasn't the sort of whale-watching my wife and I had hoped for, but, in Kishimoto, on the southern tip of Japan, I was learning to expect the unexpected.

Kishimoto was the halfway point on my tour of the Wakayama region. Wakayama is a mere bullet-train ride from Tokyo, but a world away from the city's neon lights and busy streets. Here, snow-capped mountain landscapes, turquoise rivers and rugged coastline are ancient pilgrimage routes which were recently awarded world heritage status by Unesco.

BULLETTAINS

WE HAD AN our own pilgrimage by taking the bullet train (Japan Railways) from Tokyo to Osaka — a two-and-a-half-hour journey — followed by a three-hour drive south to Tanabe. Threading around Japan, we found the railways super-efficient and a week's pass for £190 — which you have to buy in the UK in advance — got us on some of the smokiest Shinkansen trains. Newspaper the region was made easier with map and

timetable downloads from the excellent Tanabe city site (tb-kurumao.jp/en).

TANABE

TANABE was the perfect introduction to the local cuisine and partying culture. In the town's "entertainment district" we enjoyed a great meal (about £35 per head) and began a Japanese-style pub crawl, starting in a jazz bar and ending with a nightcap at our ryokan, as traditional inn are known.

Drinks cost about £1 and I became hooked on the local sake rice wine. Cold sake is the best quality and it is poured into a glass in a wooden box until both the box and the glass are perfectly full. Then everyone shouts "Kampai!" (cheers) before knocking it back. After a few of those drinks the normally restrained locals came out of their shells.

THE PILGRIM ROUTE

AFTER our night of excess we were ready to join the pilgrimage proper. For centuries, pilgrims walked a 45-day round trip here in search of health and enlightenment. These days tourists hike the trails along with mysterious bearded warriors

AMAZON BASIN, ECUADOR



called the Yamabushi. They are SAS-style, endurance-harvested monks who dress in white with slippers and pompons.

The ancient trails link spiritual sites and towns. Walking them was blissfully stress-relieving and offered stunning views. We'd about six hours a day passing through villages and massive tree-trunk forests. I encountered a type of little deer with devil's horns, while huge, lacy spiders curved themselves in the trees. Our journey also introduced me to a particular Japanese obsession unknown to many westerners: the roses.

HOT SPRINGS

ONSEN are natural hot springs usually found in the ryokan (see japaneseguesthouses.com for details of ryokan along the pilgrimage trail). These range from plush spas to more basic wooden basins.

Onsen are as central to Japanese culture as the cup of tea is to the Brits — an everyday pleasure, only with more nudity.

In the right context, getting naked in front of people is okay by me, but the onsen experience took some getting used to. The baths were single sex, but bored-looking female onsenists occasionally showed up in the men's. And being Japanese, where politeness and etiquette hold sway, onsen



have complicated rituals. It was the peeing ritual of group washing that presented the main challenge. At my first onsen I sat with a row of naked men on a seat with a hole in the middle and started to wee. There was a mirror, black shampoo, silver liquid soap and a shower head. It felt odd at first, but then the enthusiastic bottom-washing began. It was a real eye-to-the-floor moment as men of all ages bent over to give themselves a good scrub.

Afterwards, I made my way to the springs where the aches from a day's walking melted away. My wife described the women's onsen as similar to the men's — apart from

butt-crunching knickers. If a Japanese woman asks: "Does my butt look big in this?", you should say yes.

ETIQUETTE

WHAT to say and how to behave is difficult to gauge at first in Japan — ritual and etiquette can be a minefield. Everyone seemed to want a business card and how you present it is of the utmost importance. Even blowing your nose in front of people is considered rude. Generally, though, there is widespread tolerance of ignorant westerners so it's hard to cause real offence. The closest I came was when I mistakenly drank beer at a Shinto shrine. An irate passer-by blared at me in his best English: "Bring your beer and go from this place!" I gave him an apologetic bow, made like a pectoral over the road.

WHAT could be more romantic than a weekend tucked up in a cosy fisherman's cabin in the Dordogne in south-west France?
